Combat with corona goes door to door

t's a door-to-door battle Harvana is waging in its villages against the deadly Covid-19. The deft battle strategy was evolved under the first-of-its-kind Haryana Rural General Health Check Scheme, especially designed to conduct health check-ups of people in the rural areas, and to squelch the virus which seems to have crested in the hinterland. the hinterland.

The weaponry deployed and the art the weapointy deployed and the strategy employed by the Mano-har Lal Government were shared at a meeting the Prime Minister had with the Chief Ministers of 11 states and district magistrates of 60

districts through video-conferencing on May 20, 2021.

Though a wide range of initiatives taken by the state government were showcased at the meeting, what attracted attention was the rural or instruction of tion was the rural orientation of the offensive spearheaded by the Haryana Rural General Health Check Scheme.

Needless to emphasise, the skillful and speedy handling of Covid-19 through proactive mea-sures taken to trail and tame the

wily virus, has begun to tell. The data tells the tale.

The number of fresh cases has The number of fresh cases has come down by 50 per cent in the seven days ended May 24; 18 of the 22 districts have more recoveries than cases; and the recovery rate went up from 86.7 per cent on May 15 to 94 per cent on May 25. Multi-pronged is the approach; multi-layered is the attack; and multi-disciplinary are the 8,000-odd teams constituted to trace, track and treat the patients. Split into Field and Headquarters levels

into Field and Headquarters levels from the standpoint of functionality, the multi-disciplinary teams have been tasked with implemen-

tation of the scheme.

The 8,000 multidisciplinary teams are out conducting door-to-door surveys in the villages. Until May 24, about 5,000 teams had May 24, about 5,000 teams had fanned out in the rural deep, cov-ered 4,559 villages and examined more than 64 lakh members of 14.46 lakh families. Asha workers, Anganwadi workers, school teachers, Panchayati Raj representatives and health volunteers are included in the Field team.

While the Field teams identify those having Covid-19-like symptoms, the Headquarters teams en-sure treatment of such patients at lages. Specially prepared Covid safe kits are given to every patient who is undergoing treatment in

The kit includes 15 medicines, medical devices, nine allopathic, three AYUSH medicines, streamer, digital thermometer and oximeters. Primary Health Centre in every

village has been converted into a 20-bedded Covid hospital and iso-lation centres have been set up in about 1,310 villages with a capaci-ty of 18,270 beds.

ty of 18,270 beds.

Be it setting up new Covid hospitals and isolation centres; provisioning for more Covid beds which aggregate 13,700 plus; beds with oxygen (12,375); ramping up testing (52,000 plus/day) or ratcheting up vaccination (46,000 plus/day), the Manohar Lal Government has

come up trumps.

Besides fighting the Covid bat-tle, the Chief Minister is playing the guardian angel to the BPL families which are being given free treatment. He has also decided to give ex gratia relief of Rs 2 lakh to such BPL families as have lost a member to Covid-19

And the battle rages with advantage tilting the scales in favour of the state government.

Farmers get Rs 356 cr under

a big financial boost, a sum of Rs 356,15,90,000 has been credited into bank accounts of 17,29,311 farmers as the 8th instalment of Pradhan Mantri Kingston and the stalment of Pradhan san Samman Nidhi (PM-KISAN) Scheme. The Prime Minister, Mr Narendra Modi, while releasing the amount on May 14, lauded the efforts of farmers who have made record produce in food grains and horticulture amid difficulties during the pandemic.

The Haryana Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, while welcoming the the decision to release the 8th installment of PM-KISAN Yoiana, said the scheme, launched 32 months ago, is a revolutionary step in the interest of farmers. Haryana clocks a milestone

Two 500-bed Covid hospitals built within 3 weeks

Taging a relentless fight against Covid-19 Hary-ana has achieved a big milestone by setting up two 500-bed Covid hospitals in Panipat and Hisar within a short span of 2-3 weeks where a provision for round-the-clock oxygen supply has been made from the nearby industrial houses

The first of its kind feat in the country will not only go a long way in strengthening health infrastructure in Haryana but would also prove to be a boon for people in the region.

Inaugurating the two hospi-ls Chief Minister Manohar Lal lauded the remarkable efforts of the state officials and said that the novel idea of setting up the two hospitals close to industrial houses came to him after he realised that

availability of oxygen was going to be a tall order in view of the severity of pandemic.

He underlined that the supply of oxygen from outside the state has been in a liquid form and it would become quite an expensive and time-taking process to con-vert it into gas form for supplies to the patients. With the setting up of hospitals close to industrial houses, where oxygen is available in abundance, this problem could

"For hospitals with nearby in-dustrial houses there would be no problem of this kind and the oxygen supplies would remain unin-terrupted", said the chief minister

adding that more such hospitals are likely to be opened in the state.

The 500-bed Panipat hospital, set up adjacent to the Panipat Refinery at a cost of Rs 28 crores, has been named after Guru Teg Baha dur to commemorate the 400 birth

anniversary of the Sikh guru. It would have a team of five SMOs, 30 doctors, about 150 nurses and 46 pharmacists besides senior students from medical colleges.

The chief minister had a special word of thanks for the panchayat of village Bal Jatana which not only donated land for the hospital but also made a contribution of Rs one crore in the cost of the hospital.

The hospital in Hisar, named after Jannayak Chaudhary Devi Lal has come up close to the Jindal Industries from where interrupted oxygen supply would come. Built at a cost of Rs 28 crores the hospital would have five SMOs, 45 doctors and around 40 MBBS interns

The chief minister was grateful to the Jindal Industries for joining hands with the state government in this venture. With this the Haryana government has made a provision of 12,375 oxygen beds and 5214 ventilators/ICU in the state. The Chief Minister said an amount of Rs 19,000 crore had been transferred into the accounts of farmers of the country. "It shows that the Central Government is indeed moving towards realizing the vision of Atmanirbhar Bharat by uplifting farmers," he said, adding that the BJP remains committed to holistic development of farmers, who constitute the backbone of our economy

Efforts are constantly on to provide new solutions and new options in farming. Promoting organic farming is also one such effort. Organic farming delivers more profit and is now being practiced across the nation by young farmers.



Haryana turns over a new leaf in fight against corona

its fight against Covid-19 Haryana has turned a new leaf with the launching of "Sanje-evani Pariyojna" meant to provide medical care to corona patients with mild to moderate symptoms at their homes

at their nomes.

The pilot project has taken off from Karnal where it was launched by Chief Minister Manohar Lal and would soon be extended to other districts of the state. One of the key highlights of the project is that it would save patients from go-

ing to hospitals.
Its main focus would be in rural areas where there has been a general lack of awareness about the intensity of the second wave of pandemic and how to treat the ailment.

With the right processes and care, officials believe home conva-lescence is possible for over 90 per cent of patients.

The project would also focus

on post-Covid care of patients as an increasing number of patients have been facing health problems even after they had tested negative for Covid

Launching the project the chief minister said that there was a sud-den surge of cases during the second wave and it was then that the State

Government swung into action and made efforts to meet the demand for medicines, oxygen cylinders, ICU beds et al. Also, when the con-tagious virus reached the villages the State Government formulated policies to contain the spread of the virus which included the formation of constituting committees to monitor COVID cases in rural areas and the setting up Isolation Centres. The Sanjeevani Pariyojna, he said, was yet another step forward to intensify

the fight against Corona

This Project would enable the management of critical resources like hospital beds availability, oxygen supply, ambulance track-ing and door-to-door awareness campaign to enable a crystal clear overview of the healthcare system for the district administration.

With the implementation of this Project the State Government will be able to enhance the medical facilities and will provide three-tier or private hospitals equipped with ICU facilities for critical patients.

Fake Covid drug unit sealed in Nalagarh

In a major crackdown on black-marketing of counterfeit drugs, Haryana Police has sealed a 'pharmaceutical unit' located at sealed a 'pharmaceutic unit' located at Nalagarh in Himachal Pradesh which was manufacturing large quantities of fake remdesivir injections. The unit was sealed

along with the drug control authorities of Haryana and Himachal Pradesh.

An FIR in the case was registered in Ambala following the seizure of 24 remdesivir vials from the possession of four

In all, 11 accused In all, 11 accused have been arrested so far for selling the vials, considered a life-saving drug in the pandemic, to the needy people at exorbitant rates.

In all 673 fake
remdesivir injections
were recovered of
which 423 vials were
seized from the arrested
accused. The remaining
250 vials were recovered from the unit which was subsequently sealed.

Fighting the virus

The world is in the midst of a Covid-19 pandemic. As the World Health Organization (WHO) and partners work together on the response - tracking the pan-demic, advising on critical interventions, distributing vital medical supplies to those in need - they are racing to develop and deploy safe and effective vaccines.

Vaccines save millions of lives each year. Vaccines work by training and preparing the body's natural defenses – the immune system – to recognize and fight off the viruses and bacteria they target. After vaccination, if the body is later exposed to those disease-causing germs, the body is immediately ready to de-stroy them, preventing illness.

There are several safe and effective vaccines that prevent people from getting seriously ill or dying from Covid-19. This is one part of manag-ing Covid-19, in addition to the main preventive measures of staying at least one metre away from others, covering one mene away from onies, covering a cough or sneeze in your elbow, fre-quently cleaning your hands, wearing a mask and avoiding poorly ventilated rooms or opening a window.

Take whatever vaccine is made available to you first, even if you have already had Covid-19. It is important to be vaccinated as soon as possible once it is your turn and not wait. Approved Covid-19 vaccines provide a high degree of protection against getting seriously ill and dyvaccine is 100 per cent protective.

WHO SHOULD GET VACCINATED

The Covid-19 vaccines are safe for most people 18 years and older, including those with pre-existing conditions of any kind, including au-to-immune disorders. These conditions include hypertension, diabetes, asthma, pulmonary, liver and kidney disease, as well as chronic infections that are stable and controlled.

There is not yet enough evi-dence on the use of vaccines against Covid-19 in children to make recommendations for children to be vac-cinated against Covid-19. Children and adolescents tend to have milder disease compared to adults. However, children should continue to have the recommended childhood vaccines.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO AFTER VACCINATION

Stay at the place where you get vac-cinated for at least 15 minutes after-wards, just in case you have an unusuwards, just in case you have an unusu-al reaction, so health workers can help you. Check when you should come in for a second dose – if needed. Most of the vaccines available are two-dose vaccines. Check with your care pro-vider whether you need to get a sec-ond dose and when you should get it. Second doses help boost the immune

response and strengthen immunity. In most cases, minor side effects

are normal. Common side effects after vaccination, which indicate that a person's body is building protec-tion to Covid-19 infection, include arm soreness, mild fever, tiredness headaches, muscle or joint aches Contact your care provider if there is redness or tenderness (pain) where you got the shot that increases after 24 hours, or if side effects do not go

24 hours, or if side effects do not go away after a few days.

If you experience an immediate severe allergic reaction to a first dose of the Covid-19 vaccine, you should not receive additional doses of the vaccine. It is extremely rare for severe health reactions to be directly caused by vaccines. Even after you're vaccinated, keep taking precautions. While a Covid-19 vaccine will prevent serious illness and death. will prevent serious illness and death we still don't know the extent to which it keeps you from being infect-

ed and passing the virus on to others. The more we allow the virus to spread, the more opportunity the virus has to change. Continue to take actions to slow and eventually stop the spread of the virus. Keep at least one metre from others. Wear a mask, especially in crowded, closed and poorly ventilated settings. Clean your hands frequently. Cover any cough or sneeze in your bent elbow. When in-doors with others, ensure good ventilation, such as by opening a window. Doing it all protects us all.

Big relief: Rates of key tests capped

iving a big sigh of relief to the patients, suspected or confirmed, who may require to get investigated for HRCT Chest and other lab inrestigations such as II.-6, D-Dimer, LDH, CRP, Procalcitonin, Ferritin, etc. the Haryana Government has capped the rates of these tests required for diagnosis or treatment of COVID-19 and poet-COVID-19 patients.

and post-COVID patients. Sharing more details regarding the same, an official spokesperson said that as per the orders, the rate of CT/ HRCT scan of the chest

had been fixed at Rs.2100. However, for IL-6, D-Dimer, LDH, CRP, Procalcitonin, Ferritin, an amount of Rs. 1000, Rs. 400, Rs. 250, Rs. 350, Rs. 1500 and Rs. 300 respective-

ly would be charged.

These rates are inclusive of all the expenses involved in testing that is PPE, packing.

testing that is PPE, packing, documentation, reporting and GST Taxes (if any).

However, in the case of the home collection, an extra amount of Rs. 200 per home visit, irrespective of several samples collected, is allowed

to cover the expenses incurred for transportation, PPE kit and

manpower etc.

These rates do not apply to the CT Scan centres providing services to Health Department under PPP mode, for which the existing rates would prevail, said the spokesperson said the spokesperson. Non-adherence to these or-

ders may invoke penalty under section 188 of the IPC.

The spokesperson said that the decision of capping the rates had been taken after various observations of uneven and exorbitant rates being charged by various private hospitals, diagnostic cen-tres and Labs have been received via media and other modes.

Therefore, after due consideration on the matter of the cost of reagents and consumables, the state government, exercising the powers bestowed under the Epidemic Diseases Act, 1897, has capped the maximum charges to be levied for the above-mentioned tests.

The Haryana Government has been taking various mea-sures to combat COVID-19 pandemic and is providing free testing and treatment in govern-ment hospitals across the state,

The Helpers Society of Shahabad is one such example. The Society is engaged in distributing food packets to the Corona-affected patients and survivors at nine places in Kurukshetra district.

When reached over the telephone, Mr Tilak Aggarwal, head of the Helpers Society, told Haryana Review that during the first wave of corona last year, the Society arranged two-time meals for the patients at the General Civil Hospital, Shahabad, for 12 months, and provided free dry ration and cooked freed to the wavener of resolutions. and cooked food to thousands of people.

rites of the unclaimed bodies of the corona-affected patients and their ashes were immersed in the Ganga. Members of the Society are now serving victims of the disease and the needy 24X7 during the second wave.

Mr Aggarwal said the Home Goods Asso-ciation of Shahbad also offered cooked food to about 35-40 corona-affected families. Those rendered jobless to the lockdown are given dy ration and cooked food. It is also distributing twotime meals in nine service towns of Shahabad, at the shelter home near the railway station, and the slum dwellers under the Barara Bridge, he added.

shum dwellers under the Barara Bridge, he added. The Founder Chairman of the Helpers Society, Dr. Pradeep Goyal, said the organization worked on the notion of "Nar Seva, Narayan Seva". Two-time meals have also been sent by the Society to the Adesh Medical College and Hospital in Ambala for the Covid-affected patients and the needy. The Society has 22 members, all fired with the zeal to serve humanity, "We shall always stand with the victims and survivors of the pandemic," Dr Goyal added.

76 racketeers held in crackdown

hough not many, there are ele-ments out to make money out of people's suffering by indulging in black-marketing of vital medical supplies like Remdesivir injections, oxygen and other drugs vital for the Covid-19 patients gasping for breath and struggling for life. But the Haryana Police is giving them a

But the Haryana Police is giving them a hot chase and has nabbed many.

Stepping up action against such bad elements across the state, the Haryana Police have arrested 76 accused engaged in black-marketing of oxygen, oxygen cylinders and Remdesivir injections. Not that it has given up its hunt for othsers.

According to the Director General of Po-lice (DGP), Haryana, Mr Manoj Yadava, a total of 132 Rendesivir injections and 411 oxygen cylinders have been recovered by lodging 37 FIRs across the state. Instead of

making the recovered cylinders and injection a case property, these are being given to the civil administration for treatment of

the infected patients.
As many as 23 FIRs have been reg-As many as 23 FIRs have been registered in connection with black-marketing of Ramdev Sivir vial in 13 districts and 55 accused have been arrested in these cases which led to the recovery of 132 oxygen cylinders. Similarly, 21 accused have been arrested who engaged in black-marketing of oxygen and oxygen cylinders by lodging 14 FIRs against them in seven districts after the recovery of 411 oxygen cylinders.

The police action continues against such unlawful people. Helpline numbers have also been issued to prevent black marketing and hoarding of medicines and oxygen cylinders in the state. "The state police force is working shoulder-to-shoulder with the medical fratemity to help Covid-19 patients in fighting against the deadly wave of coronavirus.. Our district

units are extending full cooperation to civil administration in arranging resources, while maintaining law and order and continuing its routine duties. As always, for us serving the people of the state in any situation is the only priority," he said.

In view of the increase in the number of Covid-19 cases, there was a sudden increase in the demand for oxygen and anti-viral drug Remdesivir. Taking advantage of the situation, unscrupulous elements and employees of private ements and employees of private hospitals indulged in the black-marketing of oxygen and Remdesivir. Acting swiftly, the Haryana Police tightened the noose around those indulged in unethical practices when

the people were struggling to cope with Covid-19 pandemic. Apart from taking action against hoarders and black marketeers of oxygen cylinders, Haryana Police have collected a total of 1,249 cyl-inders as a voluntary contribution from factory owners, welding shop owners, gas balloons sellers and ordinary citizens, which have been made available to the District Administration for utilization. Thanks

to robust mechanisms. Harvana Police have been able to strictly enforce the lockdown order across the State and ensure the needy get 'e-pass' from 'Saralharyana' web-portal. "Haryana Police force remains at the forefront of providing services to

people during the entire course of the pandemic. It was again a challenging time with an increasing number of our personnel infected during different duties. ESI DOCTORS TO HELP FIGHT CORONA

Contributing its might to the all-out of-fensive launched by the Haryana Govern-ment to contain the Covid-19 pandemic, the Employees State Insurance (ESI) has decided to place the services of about 300 of its medical and para-medical staff at the disposal of the Health Department.

They will be on deputation to the Health

They will be on deputation to the Health Department until flurther orders, and shall assist in the treatment of Covid patients in the 500-bedded Covid hospitals being constructed in Panipat and Hisar.

Mr Anop Dhankad, Minister of State for Labour and Employment, said all departments of the state government were working in close coordination to control the situation caused by the pandemic.

Since there is a dire need for medical and para-medical staff in the Health Department, the Labour Department has de-

partment, the Labour Department has de-cided to send medical officers, pharma-cists, lab technicians, MPHW (F), MPHS etc. staff working in their ESI Hospitals on deputation. These include 136 Medical Officers, 88 Pharmacists, 26 MPHS (F), 17 Lab Technicians, 40 MPHW (F).

MEDICAL COLLEGES TO TREAT 'BLACK FUNGUS' CASES

The Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, has directed that all medical colleges in the state be notified for the treatment of 'Black state be notified for the treatment of 'Black Fungus', another major health problem which has become a cause of concern during the Pandemic. Pandit Bhagwat Dayal Sharma Postgraduate Institute, Medical Sciences, Rohtak, has been authorized to treat patients coming from Rohtak, Jind, Mahendergarh and Charkhi Dadri districts who are suffering from 'Black Fungus'. According to the Health Minister, Mr Anil Vij, all district medical officers have been directed to refer black fungus patients to the nearby medical college immediately for treatment. Medical college

mediately for treatment. Medical colleges have all facilities and specialist doctors for treating the black fungus.

'Thikhri Pehra' (community policing), launched last year when the pandemic broke, has come to revisit some villages of Haryana. Amid the surge in Covid-19 cases in the rural areas, the Haryana Government has decided to resort to the age-old practice of setting up 'Thikhri Pehra' to keep a close vigil on the movement of people in and out of villages to ensure containment of the virus.

This social tool, deployed by the state government in 2020, had proved to be effective in the prevention of virus spread in the rural areas. An order has been issued by the Chief Secretary's Office to all DCs

that they may issue or enforce necessary orders regarding the performance of patrol duty by able-bodied adult male inhabitants of the village to secure public safety un-der the relevant provisions of the Punjab Village and Small Towns Patrol Act, 1918.

DHBVN RESTRICTS PUBLIC DEALING

Conscious of the need for social distancing in the wake of the surge in Covid cases, the Dakshin Haryana Bijli Vitran Nigam (DHBVN) has restricted public dealing in its offices. Now consumers can file online complaints of electricity, including, excess billing, malfunctioning of meter or cable and cable failure.

Consumers can register their complaints through toll free number 1912 or e-mail at 1912@dhbvn.org.in. The complaints filed through online medium are monitored regularly and consumers will also be informed after resolving the complaints.

On line billing facility has already been started by DHBVN under which consumers can receive a bill by giving a missed call from the registered mobile number. The DHBVN app can be downloaded from Google Play Store to pay the bill. Bill can also be paid online by entering the account number in this app. Besides, bill payment facility is also available on other apps.

'AYUSHMAN BHARAT' COVER FOR 23 K NAMBARDARS

Keen on discharging its social mandate, the state government has decided to bring nambardars under the 'Ayushman Bharat Yojana'. This will get them benefits under the scheme in case of serious illnesses. Apart from this, smart mobile phones are being provided to them.


The Integrated Horticulture De-velopment scheme under which financial assistance is given to farm-ers for promoting the cultivation of fruits, vegetables, spices, flowers

la, Ambala and Yamunanagar have been covered this year with an added allocation of Rs 60 crores. The plan has been to cover areas of Shivalik hills.

Till now, the scheme was con-fined to Kaithal, Faridabad and Rewari districts. Besides, the cultiva-tion of onion crop and mushroom would be undertaken on a large scale under the scheme.

Under the scheme, two major activities proposed to be taken would be to promote the formation





of Farmer Interest Groups (FIG) Farmer Producer Organisations (FPO) that are engaged in introducing and promoting the lat-est technologies, spread awareness

about the ill effects of pesticides.

The focus would also be motivating SC farmers for adoption of the latest technologies for which a provision of subsidy has been made.

Officials said the Haryana government is also collaborating with international agencies for the transfer of international technologies in the State with the objective of increasing the productivity of the crops. Efforts have been to train farmers in growing varied crops so that their income is enhanced and the quality of land does not suffer.

Special teams of the department have been entrusted with the task of educating farmers on not letting the quality of soil suffer in the course of cultivating new crops

An important bulwark provided by the government has been that the farmers would be incentivised during low prices of their produce in wholesale markets. A total of 19 horticulture crops (vegetable/ fruit/spice) are covered under the ruitspice) are covered under the scheme. The government proposes to set up a corpus fund for the facilitation of producers in marketing their produce, particularly in the case of perishable commodities like fruits and vegetables.

The "Mukhyamantri Bagwani Bima Yojana (MBBY)" launched

this year is also aimed at encour aging farmers to use innovative and modern agricultural practices. The major objectives of the scheme are to facilitate farmers to raise horticultural crops to increase their income level and to ensure the financial sus-tainability of farmers suffering from crop losses due to adverse weather and natural calamities.

As many as 20 crops covered under the MBBY are that of Toma-to Onion Potato Cauliflower Pea Carrot Bhindi Bottle Gourd Bitter Gourd Brinjal Chilly Capsicum Cabbage Radish Spices Turmeric Garlic, Kinnow Guava Mango and Ber. A provision of 'Rs ten crores has been made in the current financial year for the scheme.




