Religious fervour marks 400th Prakash Purab

eligious fervour permeated the atmosphere thick and strong as the Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, led the state to commemorate the 400th Prakash Purab of the ninth Sikh guru, Guru Tegh Bahadur ji, on the sprawling grounds in Panipat.

Lakhs of devotees from across the state congregated to pay their respect to the Sikh guru, who was also known as "Hind Ki Chadar".

Rich tributes were paid to the Guru even as the Prime Minister, Mr Narendra Modi, in his message said India would reach the pinnacle of glory taking inspiration from the values and ideals of the Sikh Gurus.

Donning a Kesari turban, the Chief Minister went to the main 'Pandal' and paid obeisance to Sri Guru Granth Sahib before greeting the Sangat with folded hands.

He took part in "gatka" and partook of the langar underscoring the message of commitment and

sacrifice embodied by Guru Tegh Bahadur ji in his life.

"Remember the heroes, not villians"

The Chief Minister said that Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji sacrificed himself for religious freedom and humanity. History tells us how a delegation of Kashmiri Pandits called on Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji to seek his help in saving them from forced and ruthless conversions by the Mughals. He pondered over the problem and said that this would need a great sacrifice. Guru Sahib's son Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji, sitting nearby, quickly said "who will be worthier than you to make such a sacrifice". After this .as Guru Sahib Ji challenged Aurangzeb, he was subjected to severe torture before Aurangzeb ordered his beheading. Calling the tyrannical ruler Aurangzeb a villain, the Chief

Minister said that everyone should remember the heroes of the country not the villains.

"Today we are celebrating the 400th Prakash Purab of Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji as a part of the ongoing celebrations of Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav.

The main purpose of organizing such a grand Samagam is to ensure that the inspiring stories of the supreme sacrifices made by Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji reach every part of the country and our future generations can take inspiration from it," the Chief Minister added.

The Chief Minister said that Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji always shared a special bond with Haryana as during his lifetime he had travelled six times through Haryana and Punjab. Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji visited 32 gurdwaras of Haryana.

He also visited places like

Dhamtan Sahib, Manji Sahib, Garhi Sahib, Karah Sahib etc. The final journey of Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji when he was beheaded also passed through Haryana.

CM's announcements

The Chief Minister, during his address, announced that the ground where this state-level function was held will be named after Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji. In addition, the road by which the palanquin carrying Guru Granth Sahib ji was brought would be named as Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur

He also announced that a Government Medical College named after Guru Tegh Bahadur ji would be built in Yamunanagar.

An exhibition of the weapons used by Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji would be conducted across the country, for which the State Government will donate a special vehicle to safely carry the rare relics of Guru Ji.

Free booster dose for 18 to 59-year-old

he Haryana Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, has announced free booster dose for adult beneficiaries falling in the age group of 18 years to 59 years.

The eligible beneficiaries can get the booster dose worth Rs 250 free of cost from any government hospital or dispensary. There are about 1.2 crore such beneficiaries falling within the said age group

in Haryana and the total cost of about Rs 300 crore will be borne by the state from the COVID Relief Fund.

In view of the surge in COVID cases, the Chief Minister has appealed to the people to wear masks and ensure strict adherence of COVID appropriate behaviour like washing hands frequently etc. Adhering to COVID guidelines is the biggest tool in the fight against Corona and vaccination is the second weapon.

The Chief Minister said it would be ensured that the eligible beneficiaries in the age group of 18 years to 59 years would be given free booster doses to protect each and every person of the state from the highly contagious COVID.

It is noteworthy that so far more than 2.33 crore first doses of the COVID vaccine and 1.88 crore people have been administered both doses of the vaccine in Haryana. Also, about 3,71700 booster doses have been

administered till now

While strictly adhering to the guidelines issued by the Union Health Ministry related to enforcement of 'COVID-19 Appropriate Behaviour' Haryana has again adopted proactive strategies to effectively combat the new surge in the virus.

This was stated by the Chief Secretary, Mr Sanjeev Kaushal, while speaking at a meeting chaired by the Union Home Secretary, Mr Ajay Bhalla, to review the COVID-



19 situation and preparedness in Delhi NCR.

Assuring the Union Home Secretary regarding timely and regular updating of the COVID-19 data on the portal, he said that the district administration had already been issued directions in this regard.

ob-orientation of education continues to inform policies and programmes of the Haryana Government. On April 21, 2022, the state moved a step closer to realizing the dream of the Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, to provide 'job-oriented' rather than certificate-oriented' education in the state.

happened when the This Haryana Skill Development Mission (HSDM) signed an agreement with Magic Billion (Unit TGM Services Pvt. Ltd.), a registered India International Skill Centre (IISC) as a National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) partner for international apprenticeship, employment opportunities in Germany for the youth of the state.

According to the terms of the agreement, Magic Billion would provide residential training to about 200 candidates in various sectors, including nursing, hospitality, food retail, restaurant service and construction.

This was stated by Mr Sanjeev Kaushal, Chief Secretary, while chairing the 7th meeting of the Governing Council of HSDM.

World Skill Centre

A 'World Skill Centre' to provide training to the youth in vocational education and development would be set up at GITI, Musaidpur, Gurugram.

The training provider will ensure a minimum of 70 per cent placement to successfully certified candidates with domestic and international brands within India as well as overseas (minimum 15 per

Besides, the provider would also ensure adequate infrastructure development, along with course curriculum development, training of master trainer, and various recurring and non-recurring activities of the training.

The training provider will also provide training in foreign languages as required giving capacity building training to 50 ITI's instructors, trainers through International Master Trainers, free of cost.

The Chief Secretary was apprised of the fact that in the first phase, a target to train 680 candidates in various sectors, including tourism and hospitality, retail, IT and ITES, accounts, banking and finance, logistics, and beauty and wellness has been set.

Under the state-funded SURYA scheme, so far 43,165 trainees have been mobilized and 10,517 are undergoing training. SURYA is an acronym for Skilling, Up-skilling, Re-skilling of Youth Assessment funded by state. Under this scheme target allocation has been done for short-term training (STT), Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL), Driver Training, and Heavy Motor Vehicle Driver Training (HMV).

PMKVY 3 target met

With the enrollment of 2,058 people, Haryana has achieved 100 per cent completion targets for short term training (STT), while in recognition of prior learning (RPL) the state has achieved 92 per cent of the target under the Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojna (PMKVY 3.0)—Centrally Sponsored State Managed (CSSM component) for FY 2021-22.

The Chief Secretary was apprised that an agreement has been signed between the State Urban Development Authority, Haryana (SUDAH) and HSDM for the implementation of the EST&P component under National Urban Livelihood Mission (NULM) from the financial year 2022-23.

Wheat procurement gains momentum

There should be wide facilities in the market for farmers and labourers so that no one has to face any kind of inconvenience. From April 1, the procurement of wheat has started across the state through various government agencies.

The Deputy Chief Minister was recently presiding over the review meeting regarding procurement and lifting of wheat being done by the government agencies. Senior officers of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare Department, Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs Department and other concerned departments were present in the meeting.

Till April 19, about 35.87 lakh metric tonnes of wheat has been procured. Out of which 23.13 lakh metric tonnes of wheat have been lifted from the grain markets and Rs 3,686.09 crore has been paid to the farmers for their crops at minimum support price./HR/

Wherever the Sikh Gurus visited and travelled in Haryana, Gurudwaras were built in their memory. Today, these Gurudwaras remind about the legacy of the

Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji, who had refused to bow down before the Mughals and sacrificed his life, visited various places in Haryana where gurudwaras came up in due course. These Gurudwaras are an invaluable heritage for Haryana.

As the nation celebrates 400th Prakash Purab of the ninth Guru, the state government under the guidance of Chief Minister Mr Manohar Lal has made special arrangements in Gurudwaras built in the memory of Guru Teg

Gurudwara Patshahi Nauvi (Ninth), Kharak Bhura, Jind

Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji reached Kharak Bhura in 1665. He stayed there for a night and gave religious sermons and advised his disciples to follow the path of truth and oneness of God. A Gurudwara Sahib in village Kharak Bhura, which is 14 kms from Narwana and 25 kms from Jind on Narwana Road is a rich legacy in the region.

Apart from this, Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib reached village Khatkar in Jind and gave religious sermons where also a Gurudwara has been built at this place which 11 kms from Jind.

Gurudwara Manji Sahib, Jind

When Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib reached Jind from village Khatkar he helped people by constructing many wells and water tanks around the area. Now the majestic Gurudwara Manji Sahib graces the town of Jind. This Gurudwara is a unique memory of religious and social contribution to the region and is situated close to the railway station, near Rani Talab.

Gurudwara Manji Sahib, Rohtak

Sri Guru Teg Bahadur Sahib on his missionary visits would halt at village Laakhan Majra in Rohtak to bless the Sangat of this area. Guru Sahib stayed here for many days and delivered discourses. Guru Sahib on seeing the shortage of drinking water got many wells constructed and a clean water pond in this area. Because the feet of Guru Sahib lay here, this place became holy and hence Gurudwara Manji Sahib Patshahi Nauvi was built here. This Gurudwara Sahib is situated on the Jind-Rohtak road.

Gurudwara Bangla Sahib, Rohtak

When Sri Guru Tegh Bahadar Sahib came to Rohtak city during his spirituality preaching mission, he stayed here for three days and held regular sermons for the Sangat. Guru Sahib also helped in constructing wells around this area. As a memoir of his visit,

Gurudwara Neem Sahib, Kaithal

When Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji reached Kaithal he took rest here under the shade of a neem tree and also delivered sermons. As there were a host of neem trees around the place, so the place came to be popularly known as Gurudwara Neem Sahib'. This Gurudwara Sahib is situated on the western outskirts of the Kaithal city.

Guru Sahib stayed at another place in Kaithal where he used to hold regular sermons in the morning and evening. There is a Gurudwara in the memory of Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib and is situated at a distance of about one km from Gurudwara Nim Sahib.

The Gurudwara Garhi Sahib Patshahi Nauvi (Ninth) also cherishes Guru Sahib's memories which is situated in the village Garhi Nazir, Kaithal.

Gurudwara Sri Tegh Bahadur Sahib, Khanpur, Karnal

Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib had also visited Khanpur while

giving his religious sermons. He had exhorted the Sangat of the area to be ready to face the atrocities being committed by Mughal emperor Aurangzeb. There is An old fort and a well dating back to the times of Guru Sahib. This place is 7 km from the Indri bus stand and 9 km from the Ladwa bus stand. Apart from this, Gurudwara Sis Mahal is also dedicated to Guru Sahib Patshahi

Gurudwara Karah Sahib, Kurukshetra

Before Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib, Sri Guru Nanak Ji had laid his feet at this place and Sri Guru Hargobind Sahib had also visited this place. A grand Gurudwara Sahib has been built here in the memory of Guru Sahiban. This place is situated at a distance of ½ km from Karah Bus Stand, 12 km from Pehowa.

Gurudwara Sahib Patshahi Nauvi, Barna, Kurukshetra

Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji paid his sacred visit to this place in the year 1665. Guru Sahib had traveled from Kaithal to Kiratpur

Nauvi at village Tarawadi, Karnal.

through the route of Barna, Kurukshetra. The beautiful Gurudwara Sahib is dedicated to Guru Sahib in Barna village, 19 km from Kurukshetra.

Sahib while preaching Dharma

Gurudwara Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib, Harnaul, Yamunanagar

Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji had travelled to this place in 1656 on his way to Patna Sahib. There is an old well and a lake from the time of Guru Sahib. Here Gurudwara Sahib is built in memory of Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib. Gurudwara Thara Sahib Patshahi Nauvi, Jhiverheri, Yamunanagar is also a historical Gurudwara that has preserved the memory of Guru Sahib.

Gurudwara Manji Patshahi Nauvi is also a famous Yamunanagar. Gurudwara of Similarly, Gurudwaras were established where Guru visited Yamunanagar, including Gurudwara Tegh Bahadur Sahib Buria.

Gurudwara Sri Manji Sahib, Muniyarpur, Kurukshetra

Gurudwara magnificent structure built in the memory of Patshahi Navi. Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib, while staying here, apprised the Sangat about the teachings of Gurbani and preached to follow three pillars of the Sikh religion namely: 'Naam Japna (Focus of God); Kirat Karni (Honest living); Vand Chakna (sharing with others). At present, a beautiful building of Gurudwara Manji Sahib is adorned at this place. This place is at the distance of 9 km from Ladwa and 12 km from Kurukshetra New bus stand.

Gurudwara Mardon Sahib, Bhanokheri, **Ambala**

Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib had reached here with his family while returning from Patna Sahib. This place is situated outside Mardon village. Guru Tegh Bahadur Sahib preached Dharma to the Sangat at this place which is at the 13 km distance from Ambala on Jalbera Road and 5 km from

he reverence of Haryana towards Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji can be gauged from the fact that Kushal Singh Dahiya, a farmer from Badkhalsa, Sonipat, had offered his head in the service of Guru Ji.

On November 9, 1675, on the orders of Mughal emperor Aurangzeb at Chandni Chowk in Delhi, when Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Ji was beheaded, Guru's Sikh brother Jeta Ji ran towards Anandpur Sahib with Guruji's head.

The Mughal army was after him and he hid in the village of Badkhalsa in Sonipat. narrated the entire incident to the people there, thereafter the

villagers formulated a plan to safely take the holy head of Guru Ji to Anandpur Sahib.

To execute this plan, Kushal Singh Dahiya, who used to resemble Guru ji, offered his head in the service of Guru Ji. Later, the Mughal soldiers who reached the village took Kushal Singh's head assuming it to be the head of Guru ji and took it to Delhi and Bhai Jeta, who was hiding, left for Anandpur Sahib with Guru Ji's head.

The Department Information, Public Relations and Languages highlighted this anecdote from history by way of an exhibition organized in Panipat on the 400th Prakash Purab of Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur



Haryana set to be first Lal Dora-free state

ith the completion of the drone flying target in 6286 Lal Dora villages, Haryana is set to become the first 'Lal Dora' free state in the country.

Under the novel and pathbreaking initiative of the Haryana government people are bestowed the actual rights to become the owner of the property by abolishing Lal Dora. The monumental reform administrative was undertaken in order to end the practice of Lal Dora which has been prevalent in the state since 1908 during the British era. It was to separate Lal Dora from agriculture land that the Revenue department used to mark Lal Dora around the village extension land.

Prime Minister Mr Narendra Modi had earlier heaped lavish accolades on Haryana for this initiative and had subsequently directed the Central officials to implement the scheme in the whole country under the name Svamitva Yojana

Under SVAMITVA, so far the Haryana government has made 19 lakh property cards.

Chief Minister Mr Manohar Lal, who has been personally monitoring the progress in implementation of the scheme, has directed all deputy commissioners to double their efforts to complete all tasks under the scheme by this month-end.

All deputy commissioners have been told to ensure 50 percent

distribution of property cards in the next 10 days.

"Maximum generation of properties should be ensured for verified undisputed properties," the chief minister said.

Senior officials said that Drone flying, Map-1 and Map-2 (including attribute collection) have been completed in all 6286 target Lal Dora villages and the work of Map-3 would be completed soon.

Besides this, the notification of claims and objections procedure, under section 26 of the Haryana Panchayat Raj Act has been issued for all target villages.

Officials said claims and objections of around 5737 villages have been addressed and the rest

are under process. The figure of final maps of 5038 villages has been submitted to the Survey of India(SoI).

Urgent directions have been issued to Deputy Commissioners to return final ownership data to SoI for 699 villages, where claims and objections have been completed, for the generation of a final map and land parcel map of each property.

More than 19 lakh property cards prepared

At a recent review meeting chaired by the state chief secretary the officials confirmed that till now more than 19 lakh property cards have been prepared. Besides this, for the smooth issuance of property cards preparation and distribution

by districts, required training was imparted to the technical staff of all the districts on how to generate property cards from the Land Parcel Map data.

Furthermore, the districts have been directed to share updates on the number of property cards prepared and distributed by them. Along with this, the Development and Panchayats department has also been asked to share details of disputes.

The property of a Lal Dora-free village would get special recognition even as provision for loan would be available on immovable property while the villagers would acquire the right to sell or buy their property.

Lal Dora was exempted from building by-laws/construction laws/scheduled areas etc., which led to the growth of these properties. Earlier, there was no registry for house or land in Lal Dora and this led to conflicts between families and societies. Despite owning a property, there were no papers to establish the ownership of the property and there was no proper demarcation of the land used by the villagers and owned by the panchayat. Due to which public places, playgrounds, ponds, drains etc. were encroached upon in the villages.

The abolition of Lal Dora is expected to go a long way to resolve such age-old issues in villages and usher in a new era of development in the rural parts.

Innovate, upscale skills, Governor tells varsities

The Governor said education should be practical-oriented and universities should focus on emerging technologies and skill development of the youth. 2.49 lakh families identified

In order to financially empower the poorest families in the state, about 2.49 lakh families having an annual income of less than Rs 1 lakh have been identified under the Mukhyamantri Antyodaya Parivar Utthan Yojana. These were identified at 570 Melas organized at 156 places across the state in two phases.

Property cards given to 4 lakh families

nder the scheme of making the villages 'Lal Dora Mukt', implemented by the Central Government as 'SVAMITVA' Yojana' across the country, 6,487 villages in Haryana have been covered and about 4 lakh families of 3,073 villages in the state have been given property cards.

Two months to redress grievances of disabled staff

CS directs all departments, boards and corporations to designate Group A officer

ith a view to redressing the grievances of disabled employees in a time-bound manner, the Haryana Government has put in place a mechanism in every department, board and corporation, public sector undertaking (PSU), Registrar of the Punjab and Haryana High Court, and registrars of all universities in the state.

Mr Sanjeev Kaushal, Chief Secretary, has directed all departments, boards and corporations to designate a Group A level officer as Grievance Redressal Officer-cum-Nodal Officer for redressing such grievances of the disabled employees working in their establishment. All such complaints shall be looked into and acted upon in two months.

Any employee aggrieved on account of any matter relating to discrimination in promotion, may file a complaint with the designated officer of the respective department. Every such complaint shall be inquired into within two months of its registration, and outcome

thereof or action taken thereon shall be communicated to the complainant /PwD.

This forms a part of the detailed instructions issued by the Chief Secretary regarding grant of reservation in promotion to persons with benchmark disabilities under the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full participation) Act, 1995.

On January 1 of every year, all departments, boards and corporations shall continue to upload data every year on the promotion of PwDs along with data on representation/direct recruit-ment of PwDs in respect of posts, services under the state government on the URL, which will be informed in near future. Directions have been issued to ensure strict compliance with these instructions in letter and in spirit.

Three per cent horizontal reservation in case of promotion to Group A, B, C and D posts shall be made for persons with benchmark disabilities with effect from January 1, 1996 to April 18, 2017.



Out of this, one per cent each for persons suffering from blindness or low vision, hearing impairment and locomotor disability or cerebral palsy, in the posts identified for each disability. Horizontal vacancy-based reservation at the rate of three per cent shall be computed on the basis of total number of vacancies to be filled by promotion occurring in the identified post/cadre of Group A,B, C and D.

Vertical reservation

Reservation for SCs and BCs is called vertical reservation and the reservation for categories such as persons with disabilities and exservicemen is called horizontal reservation. Horizontal reservation cuts across vertical reservation (which is called inter-locking reservation) and persons selected against the quota for persons with disabilities have to be placed in the appropriate category viz.SC/BC/unreserved category employees depending upon the category to which they belong in the roster meant for reservation of SCs/BCs.

In case none of the vacancies falls on point reserved for the SCs, the disabled candidate belonging to SC shall be adjusted in future against the next available vacancy reserved for SCs.

Since persons with disabilities have to be placed in the appropriate category viz. SC/BC/ unreserved in the roster meant for reservation of SCs/BCs, the application form for the post should require the candidates applying under the quota reserved for persons with disabilities to indicate whether they belong to SC/BC or unreserved category, the instructions maintain.

Now, concessional pass up to 20 kms

This has been done for the convenience of the people living around the areas of all toll plazas

falling on the National Highways. "Pass convenience" has now been extended to those living in a radius of about 20 kms of toll plazas from 10 kms. According to the new rule, passes will be made soon for the eligible people so that they can avail themselves of this facility.

Giving this information after a meeting with villagers and NHAI officers regarding the issue of toll on the Gurugram-Sohna Expressway in New Delhi, the Deputy Chief Minister, Mr Dushyant Chautala, said necessary directions had been issued to the NHAI officers.

Under the new rule of NHAI, a pass would be made for Rs 315 for



the local people living within 20 km radius of the toll plaza area on the National Highway. Earlier, this rule used to be for 5-Km but was later extended to 10 km radius. Now the limit has been further increased to 20 km. This facility would be provided to the people of the state by making "passes" for the eligible beneficiaries within a stipulated time.

Serving people through 1,150 Ayushman Centres

he Health and Wellness Centre (HWC) is a key component of the Central government's flagship Ayushman Bharat programme, under which existing Sub Health Centres and Primary Health Centres in rural and urban areas are being transformed into Ayushman Bharat-Health and Wellness Centres (AB-HWCs) to deliver an expanded range of diagnostic and clinical services for comprehensive primary health care. According to Additional Chief Secretary, Health and Family Welfare Department, Mr Rajeev Arora, apart from existing reproductive child health services, provision of required medicines, diagnostics and treatment, management of noncommunicable diseases hypertension, diabetes, oral cancer, breast cancer and cervical cancer and wellness activities including Yoga are being extended through Health and Wellness Centres.

Mission Director, National Health Mission (NHM), Mr Prabhjot Singh informed that as on April 16, 2022, a total of 1150 Ayushman Bharat-Health and Wellness Centres are operational in the state, out of which 364 are in rural PHCs, 684 in Sub Centres and 102 in urban PHCs. As many as 200 sub-health centres have also been identified whose buildings are in condemned state, reconstruction is under process. In Aspirational District Mewat/Nuh, 16 Rural-PHCs and 38 Sub Centres

existing in government buildings have been transformed into HWCs as on date. E-Sanjeevani teleconsultation services have been initiated in all the districts. A total of 62351 tele-consultations have been made till April 16, 2022.

The government has decided to bear the expenses of 3.50 lakh Antyodaya families of the state under the Ayushman Bharat scheme. Under the Ayushman Bharat scheme, the Central government has approved the benefit of Rs 5 lakh annually to 15 lakh BPL families of Harvana. while the number of families with an annual income of less than one lakh 80 thousand rupees in the state is about 18.50 lakh. Chief Minister Mr Manohar Lal led state government has planned to bear the expenses of 3.50 lakh BPL families in sync with his visionary thinking towards Antyodaya families.
