No fresh taxes: CM hikes allocations for all key sectors to ensure holistic Development

It is a Budget that budgets for growth and equity. The third consecutive Budget, presented for 2022-23 by the Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, who is also the Finance Minister, reflects his resolve and drive to pace up economic recovery, and smoothen the state's journey on the road to realizing sustainable development goals. Counter-cyclical fiscal measures have been taken to give impetus to the economy.

Having a reformist pulse, the Budget seeks to effect systemic changes to bring about a paradigm shift in the processes involved to hasten development and delivery to the last man standing in the true spirit of Antyodaya. It also holds a mirror to the vision of the Chief Minister to make Haryana play a significant role in the endeavour of the Prime Minister, Mr Nraendra Modi, to make Indiaa \$5-trillion economy.

Fiscal prudence combined with pragmatism and prioritized spending in key areas, not populism, informs the proposals which put the money where the mouth is. Allocations have been increased for most key sectors: Health and Medical Education up by 21.65 pc; Education (17.6 pc); Agriculture (27.7 pc); Road and Rail Infrastructure (59.2 pc); Social Justice (22.47 pc); Rural and Urban sectors up by 83.3 pc and 54.28 pc, respectively. They get due focus to

ensure comprehensive socioeconomic growth. Aptly christened as 'Vajra Budget,' it has the potential to lend the strength of steel to the economy.

The decisions to set up four new medical colleges at Palwal, Charkhi

burnish the credentials of the state as a sports powerhouse.

Going beyond the remit of being an annual statement of accounts, the Budget builds the foundation of a bright economic future of the state. The stones used to lay the foundation and the reforms made to weigh the effect of every rupee spent and fix accountability.

That the economy is on the uptick post-Pandemic, and revenue collection is buoyant explains the decision not to levy any new taxes.

taxes at Rs 8,925.98 crore, and grants-in-aid of Rs 11,565.86 crore. Besides, capital receipts are projected at ₹ 5,393.89 crore. The expenditure has been projected to increase to Rs.1,77,255.99 crore from Rs.1,53,384.40 crore in RE 2021-22, upby 15.6 per cent.

Fiscal discipline has helped in keeping the parameters intact. Haryana has succeeded in keeping the fiscal deficit within the percentage of GSDP as recommended by the Fifteenth Central Finance Commission for 2021-22. It is estimated to be 2.99 pc of GSDP in 2021-22. For 2022-23, it is estimated to come down to 2.98 pc. This is well within the limit of 3.5 pc fixed by the Finance Commission.

The debt-to-GSDP in the Revised Estimates for 2021-22 is estimated at 24.98 pc against the 32.6 pc limit recommended by the Finance Commission. In the Budget Estimates for 2022-23, the debt stock is expected to be 24.52 pc of GSDP, well below the stipulated limit of 33.3 pc. The SGDP has increased from Rs 3,70,535 crore in 2014-15 to Rs 5,88,771 crore in 2021-22, an annual increase of 6.5 per cent.

The 'Vajra' model of growth the Budget envisages will not only steel-frame economic and human development but will also make the ease of living easy still; uplift the poor and the underprivileged; increase productivity by adopting new technology, generate jobs and promote entrepreneurship.

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Anti-conversion bill to check nefarious practices: CM

he Prevention of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Bill, 2022, does not stop anyone who is willingly taking recourse to conversion but is meant to address social anxiety in the state following aspate of incidents in which the conversions took place surreptitiously.

It simply manifests the state's determination not to allow forced conversions through allurement or any other fraudulent means which is disastrousforsociety.

Chief Minister Manohar Lal said thatthis Billdoes not stop anyone who is willingly doing a conversion. It just makes a provision that such a person hastosubmitanapplication for willful conversion before the District Magistrate. The chief ministers aid the state government wanted to check nefarious activities in the name of conversions.

He said that any religious priest or any person intending to organise a conversion shall give prior notice to the District Magistrate giving information about the venue where such conversion is proposed to be conducted.

Ifanypersonhasanobjectiontothis conversion, then they can file their objection in writing within 30 days. The District Magistrate shall investigate and decide whether the conversion is intended to be in contravention of Section 3 of the Bill. If so, then he shall decline the intended

conversion by passing a reasoned order. An appeal can be made against the order passed by the District Magistrate before the Divisional Commissionerwithin 30 days.

If the conversion is done by allurement, use of force, or fraudulent means, coercion, then there is a provision of imprisonment of 1 year to 5 years and a fine of not less than Rs 1 lakh. If religion is concealed with the intention to marry, then the person shall be punished with imprisonment of 3 years to 10 years and shall also be liable to pay a fine which shall not be less than Rs. 3 lakh.

Whoever contravenes the provision of section 3 of this bill in respect of mass conversion shall be punished with the imprisonment for a term which shall not be less than five

years, which may extend to ten years, and shall also be liable to pay a fine not less than Rs4lakh.

The Chief Minister clarified that manyincidentshavecometothenotice of the state wherein people are being converted through various allurements. Some of them were even forcibly converted. Besidesthis, there have also been cases where girls of other religions were married by misinterpreting their religionand such girls were forced to convert after marriage.

Such incidents not only violate our religious freedom but also hurt the socio-religious fabric of society. To stop such incidents, The Haryana Prevention of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Bill, 2022 has been introduced, saidthechiefminister.

With the resolve of public service through good governance, holistic development of Haryana is being ensured by the state government while upholding the spirit of Pandit DeenDayalUpadhyaya'sAntyodaya philosophyalongwithworkingonthe guiding principles of 'Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Sabka Vishwas, Sabka Prayas' and 'Haryana Ek, Haryanvi

The Governor said that Baba Saheb Dr Bhimrao Ambedkar was of theviewthat 'anideal society is based on liberty, equality and fraternity.' Following this principle of Dr Ambedkar, the state government has ensured equitable development of every region and every section by rising above the considerations of caste, regionalism and nepotism. In the NITI Aayog SDG India Index 2020-21, Haryana is among the leading states of the country," he added.

He also appreciated the efforts of the government for efficiently tackling Covid-19 pandemic during its three waves by making adequate arrangements for containment, providing relief and ensuring treatment to the needy. The present government has brought unprecedented changes in the state to



realize the dream of 'Ram Rajya,' the epitomeofgoodGovernment.

With the objective of uplifting those at the bottom of the pyramid, the government has started 'Mukhyamantri Antyodaya Parivar Utthaan Yojana. About 11 lakh such families are identified on the Parivar Pehchan Patra portal whose annual income is less than or equal to Rs 1.80 lakh.Specialemphasisisgiventooffer ample employment and skill developmentopportunities to them so astoincreasethefamilyincomeofsuch families to at least Rs 1.80 lakh per annum.Inthefirstphaseofthescheme,

about 37,000 families have been identified through 289 Antyodaya Melas organized at 156 places so as to givethemrequiredassistance.

'Lal Dora Mukt' scheme to give ownership rights has been implemented by the Central government under the name of 'SVAMITVA Yojana' across the country. Mr Dattatraya said that a massive good governance campaign has been launched across Haryana encompassingallthedepartmentsand the sectors and for this the State Governmenthas adopted the path of e-Governance while using modern technologies.

"To ensure 'Maximum Governance, Minimum Government' new e-governance initiatives have been brought in every fieldlikeLandRevenuemanagement Agriculture, Industry, Education, Social Security, etc. With the help of e-Governance, several processes have been reengineered by the government to reduce human interference and to malpractices," added Mr Dattatraya. 

he futuristic Budget 2022-23, proposals for presented to the Haryana Assembly by the Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, on March 8, 2022, seek to put the economy in high-growth trajectory and ensure that the fruits of development percolate down to the last man standing in the true spirit of Antodaya.

Given the emphasis on key sectors of the economy; taking the capital expenditure route to create assets; hand-holding such sectors as need support; and the fixation of the state government on equitable growth, the objectives seem quite gettable.

The strategy the proposals lay out for building a resurgent and resilient Haryana rests on the edifice of three key prongs: welfare of the poorest of the poor in the spirit of Antyodaya; increased productivity effective income redistribution; and creation of opportunities for employment and entrepreneurship.

That the economy of Haryana is maturing is more than underscored by the structural transformation it is going through. Experts read in this sure signs of sustainable growth. Haryana Review so unfolds the contents of the Budget as to bring out their import and the long-term effect these will have on the economic and social growth of the state.

Here go some important facets that define the Budget and open a window on the state of the economy:

Structural transformatio Haryana's economy is undergoing a structural transformation and maturing. Primarily agrarian in 1966, it has undergone significant structural transformation. In 2021-22, the contribution of the primary sector stood at 17.2 percent; of secondary sector 35.3 percent; and of tertiary sector 47.5 percent.

While the tertiary sector faces noticeable challenges due to COVID-19 Pandemic, the state government plans to provide necessary impetus to propel growth through expansion of the manufacturing activity, and, in the primary sector, through exploring new avenues for vertical growth

and diversification of activities undertaken to keep the focus on sustainability.

Growth, per capita income up the government's commitment to promoting balanced economic growth across sectors has resulted in an annual compound growth of 6.5 percent in GSDP from 2014-15 to 2021-22. This was accompanied by 4.9 percent growth in per capita income at constant prices, indicating growth in the state economy.

■ Further, organisation of the demands for grants into eight thematic areas: this exercise will help improve ease implementation, inter-departmental coordination, and help sharpen focus on achieving developmental outcomes and SDGs.

MLA Mrs Geeta Bhukkal will head the third committee, MLA Mr Ishwar Singh will chair the fourth; MLA Mrs Seema Trikha, will chair the fifth; MLA Mrs Kiran Choudhary will chair the sixth; MLA Mr Parmod Kumar Vij will chair the seventh; and MLA Mr Ghanshyam Dass Arora will be chairman of the eighth committee.

After discussing various topics of the Budget over three days—March 9 to 11--these committees will present their report in the House on March 14. The Speaker has announced to include Saturday as a working day in the official proceedings of the Assembly.

CM celebrates Women's Day in style Hikes outlay by 33.7 pc; announces gifts and award in the name of Sushma Swaraj

elebrating March 8, the International Women's Day in style, the Chief Minister, Mr Manohar Lal, dedicated his Budget for 2022-23 to women.

Wedded to the cause of their empowerment, he announced a slew of concessions and incentives for women, hiked the outlay for the Women and Social Welfare Department by 33.7 per cent to underscore his intent, and capped all these with an award of Rs 5 lakh in the name of Mrs Sushma Swaraj, the daughter of Haryana and a woman icon. It will be given to a woman achiever.

Lauding the power of mothers, he said society cannot be imagined without women. The women of Haryana have shattered many a glass ceiling, made their mark in many fields at the national and international level and done the state and the country proud.

They made their presence felt in the state Assembly also. Referring to the first female Haryana Vidhan Sabha Speaker, Mrs Shanno Devi, and the first

woman Deputy Speaker, Mrs Lekhvati Jain, the Chief Minister said this showed that women had been represented in this great House from the very beginning.

Determined to empower women, he announced the decision to increase participation of women in Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) to 50 per cent seats, instead of 33 per cent reserved at present, and a new scheme Haryana Mukhyamantri Udyami Yojana to incentivize women towards entrepreneurship.

For this, assuming that the annual income of the woman and members of her family is less than Rs. 5 lakh on the basis of the data of the Parivar Pehchan Patra, financial assistance of up to Rs. 3 lakh will be given to the self-help group in the form of a loan. Under this scheme, the Haryana Women Development Corporation will give a rebate of up to 7 percent in interest for three years.

Not stopping at that, Mr Manohar Lal also announced the decision to provide the facility of affordable housing to working women, and for this, working women hostels would be set up in Panchkula, Gurugram

Faridabad. Apart from this, possibilities of setting up three women's ashrams through 'Sahbhagita' will be explored during 2022-23.

That women's education is one of the top priorities of the Chief Minister is old hat. The process of opening a women's college within a radius of 20 km has already been set in motion. The Chief Minister announced the opening of three new women's colleges at Kudal and Chhapar in Bhiwani district and Gannaur in Sonipat district.

Self-Help Groups have played an important role to ensure women's empowerment. Adding weight to their value, the Chief Minister has set a target of setting up 10,000 Self Help Groups in 2022-23. Apart from this, families of women whose annual income is Rs 1.8 lakh or less, will be given assistance from the central and state government. This will benefit about 50,000 families of the state and increase their income.

He laced these incentives and concessions with asking the House to pass a unanimous resolution to increase the representation of women to 50 per cent in Panchayati Raj Institutions.

BORROWING BELOW LIMITS: Despite COVID-19, only about Rs 30,820 crore was borrowed from the market against the permissible limit laid down by the Fifteenth Finance Commission of Rs 40,872 crore.

Haryana committed to Right to Education mission

aryana Education Minister, MrKanwarPal, has said that Haryana is committed to providing all assistance to meritorious students coming from economically weaker sections of the society and under Rule 134-A, tenper cent of seats in recognized private school sarere served for them.

While responding to a call attention motion moved during the budget session of the Vidhan Sabha the minister said an evaluation test of 55,029 students was taken for private schools, of which 36,167 students passed and 11,466 students passed for admission in government schools.

Out of these eligible children, 45,289 children were allotted schools on the basis of their choice for PhaseI and II.

He informed that in the 2021-22 academic session also, due to the closure of government - nongovernment schools in the wake of Covid-19 pandemic, the time-table could not be issued even in February-March2021.



Process for seeking aid from CMRF goes online

he process for seeking financial assistance on medical grounds from the Chief Minister's Relief Fund (CMRF) has been made easy and convenient in Haryana. Mr Mnaohar Lal has launched a portal for the convenience of the applicants seeking such assistance.

Now the applicants can simply apply on the SARAL Portal through her/ his PPP ID, upload relevant documents like medical bills, OPD bills etc. and apply for financial assistance on medical

grounds from CMRF. The portal which will ease the process, marks another towards providing better health services to the people of the state.

While launching the portal, Mr Manohar Lal said it was found that with the CMRF running offline, the benefits of the scheme were not reaching the beneficiaries on time. after re-examining the earlier procedure, directions were given to digitalize the process through the SARAL Portal for the convenience of the general public seeking financial assistance. "Our



government's mandate is to ensure good governance across the state and provide benefits to the applicants within the stipulated time-frame", he added.

Giving detailed information regarding the portal, OSD to the Chief Minister, Mr Sudhanshu Gautam, said after an application is received on the portal, it is marked to the login of public representatives of the concerned area (MP, MLA, Chairman Zila Parishad, Chairman Block Samiti, Mayor/President of MCs) for which they may recommend the case within five days.

Thereafter, the application will be pushed to the deputy commissioner concerned, who, in turn, will simultaneously forward it to the Tehsildar and Civil Surgeon concerned for verification of the land details and medical documents, respectively.

A district level committee will meet fortnightly and recommend the cases for grant of financial assistance on medical grounds to the Chief Minister's office. The amount shall be transferred directly in the account of the applicant or beneficiary.

Mr Gautam said the Chief Minister had taken the decision to include another 22 serious diseases under the CMRF.

The state government is also establishing an Institute of Emerging Technologies in Manesar to promote education and research in advanced and emerging technologies.

Presenting the budget in the Vidhan Sabha on March 8, Chief Minister Mr Manohar Lal, who also holds the finance portfolio, said: "Education is the key to national development and societal advancement. The National Education Policy-2020 provides a frame work for the national objectives and goals in the education sector leading up to 2030. The state has set its implementation target of 2025 as against the national
